Puffy Paint Seashells



Supplies

Seashell(s)

Fabric paint

Paint brush

Paper towel or cloth towel

Directions:

Rinse seashell to remove sand and other debris.

Dry seashell using a paper towel or cloth towel.

When your seashell is completely dry, apply a thin horizontal line of fabric paint onto a section of your seashell and spread using your paintbrush. Then repeat until the front of the shell is fully painted. Feel free to use multiple colors on one shell!

Then use the fabric paint to add in some details. You will not need a paintbrush for this step. To add details, squeeze the paint directly from the tube onto the shell. When painting lines or outlines, make sure to apply even pressure onto the bottle to ensure lines of even thickness.

After adding your details, set your seashell aside to dry for at least 24 hours.
